Address

I have just bought tickets for the new David Hockney exhibition: 'Bigger and Closer' - on at the Lightroom, in London, until April. It is what's called an 'immersive experience', with large projections of his art onto the gallery walls. These apparently include paintings he did on his iPad, which take you on a journey of his brushstrokes, from a blank canvas to the finished work.

Some years ago, we went to a different Hockney exhibition, at the Royal Academy of Arts, called 'A Bigger Picture'. Did you see it? It was a series of very large works, some up to 50ft across and 20ft high, made up 20 or 30 different canvases, displayed together as a single image. They were landscape paintings of the Yorkshire Wolds. Here is just one of them.



Now, even as a **Yorkshireman**, I have to say that the Yorkshire Wolds are nothing special. They are an area that people generally pass *through*, on their way to somewhere else, usually **Bridlington**. But Hockney's paintings brought the Wolds to life in a dramatic and wonderful way. The paintings were stunning, inspiring, uplifting. As I walked round, I listened to the commentary on my headset, which included an interview with Hockney himself. He was asked: 'Why on earth, at the age of 75, did you decide to start painting landscapes, when landscape painting is considered so tired these days?' You could hear Hockney's voice light up as he replied: 'Oh, it's not nature that's tired. It's just our way of looking at it that's tired.'

It was a wonderful challenge to me: to look at **familiar things** with **fresh eyes**. And it proved a rich vein of blessing for me, over a long period of time. It was, you might say, an **'Epiphany Moment'**. Today we celebrate this short season of **Epiphany**. We generally associate Epiphany with the visit of the **Magi**, the **wise men**, who travel from far away, probably from Persia (present day Iran) to visit the Christ-child with their gifts. In the 4th Century, and still today in parts of the Orthodox church, Epiphany was one of the **3 great Christian festivals** – together with Easter and

Pentecost. And the focus of it wasn't just the visit of the Magi - but the revelation of Christ in three very significant moments: -

- 1. The revelation of Christ to the gentiles, in the form of these pagan astrologers, from the East.
- 2. The revelation of Christ when Jesus is baptised, by John, in the Jordan, when a voice from heaven calls him God's beloved Son.
- 3. And the revelation of Christ to his disciples, in his first miracle at a Wedding in Cana, where he changes water into a ridiculously excessive amount of wine, when they were already drunk!

The word Epiphany means: 'a moment of sudden or great revelation. An **Awakening**'. In all these cases, their eyes were opened, in a completely new way, to see something they'd **never grasped** before. A new realisation. Seeing differently, with **fresh** eyes - rather than **tired** eyes. Something where you think: 'O Gosh, I'd never realised that before.' Or: 'Wow! That's just blown my mind!' I wonder what **Epiphany moments you've** had, in the past? Maybe you had an 'Epiphany moment' in 2022? Do they happen to you often? Or are they, as they are for me, **rare** events? I wonder **where** - or **when** - your epiphany moments generally happen? Is there a particular **context** in which they occur? Maybe it's in your **daily devotions**? Maybe there's a particular **place** you go to, or a special **time of year**, when **God** speaks to you? Perhaps it's on **retreat**, or at a **festival**? Maybe it's through **literature**? Or **poetry**? Or **music**? Or **art**? What is it that opens **you** up to see things in **new** ways, with **fresh** eyes? Where and when do your '**Epiphany moments**' happen? Spend a minute or two thinking about that now.

My most recent Epiphany moment came before Christmas, reading a very short book of speeches by Volodymyr Zelensky, the president of Ukraine. It's called: 'A Message from Ukraine'. They are pithy, real and deeply spiritual. They engage *not* with abstract, hypothetical issues, but with the nitty-gritty-reality of a country at war, a country that has been invaded, violated, devastated by an enemy. I warmly commend it to you.

But let me ask you **another** question: If and when that sort of experience happens. What do you **do** with it? Is it just a '**blip'** in the midst of your ongoing life? 'Wow! That was great. Now, back to normal.'

Or does it **change** something? Does it provide you, in an ongoing way, with a different perspective? A different way of seeing things? And, does its change what you **do**? How you **live**? Does it change your **priorities**, the things you think of as important? Does it set you off in a different direction? Because that's what happened to the **Wise men**. They saw a strange star in the sky. So, presumably after some discussion, they left their comfortable homes and set off on a thousand-mile journey to - they knew not where!

And, do those Epiphany moments change your relationships? Do they challenge the way you relate to your family, to your neighbours, to people of different religions or nationalities?

It is all too easy for these experiences to be, simply, a 'blip'. Great when they happen - but with no lasting consequence. But they clearly have lasting consequences for Jesus. Because that experience of God speaking to him and the Spirit descending on him mark the beginning of Jesus' ministry. It marks the moment when he goes to the desert, to wrestle with his demons, before laying down his carpenter's tools and setting off on the costly road of ministry, which will lead him to the cross.

I wonder if there is an **Epiphany moment** *you* turn back to, again and again? I wonder what it is that *feeds* you, that *challenges* you, that *changes* you, that *strengthens* you? I wonder if you see *your heart*, *your soul*, as a storehouse, a treasure chest of such experiences? A deep *well*, that you can reach down into, and draw on, even in dark days, maybe for months, or even years, after that original, Epiphany moment?

So, in the light of your 'Epiphany moments' what might God be saying to you now? What might God be challenging you to do? What might God be preparing you for, strengthening you for, in this coming year? What might you draw on, from that deep well of your Epiphany moments, as we enter into the uncharted, choppy, yet opportunity-laden waters of 2023? And I wonder if your eyes are fresh enough, open enough, to experience new Epiphany moments this coming year? For I am sure that God hasn't finished with any of us, yet!

If David Hockney, at the age of 85, can *still* see things in a *new way*, can *still* discover *new ways* of doing things, *still* embark on new adventures, then surely, **so can we!** As he himself says: 'It's not nature that's tired. It's just our way of looking at it that's tired.'

And, what is very next verse of our gospel reading, after Jesus experiences that amazing 'high' of the **Spirit** descending like a **dove** and hears **God's voice** saying: 'This is my **beloved Son**, with whom I am well pleased.'?

The very next verse says: 'Then, the Spirit led Jesus into the wilderness, to be tested.

May God find us, up to the test, in 2023. **Amen**.
