OPENING WORDS FROM ISAIAH 42:1-4

A PRAYER OF EASTER PRAISE

Lord, we praise you. All we have comes from you. You are the resurrection and the life. We worship and adore you.

INTRODUCING OUR BIBLE READING

When it comes to the Easter story, the details in the 4 gospels differ. While all stress the empty grave, the stone rolled away. and the absent body - each offers a slightly different view, a different memory, and a different emphasis from the others. In today's reading from John, where Mary Magdalene shares her discovery of the empty tomb with the disciples, the author is careful - very careful - to show that the empty tomb on its own is not a good enough basis for a resurrection faith.

OUR BIBLE READING:

JOHN 20:1-10 (CLICK HERE TO LISTEN)

The Resurrection of Jesus

¹Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone had been removed from the tomb. ²So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, 'They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him.' ³Then Peter and the other disciple set out and went towards the tomb.

⁴The two were running together, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. ⁵He bent down to look in and saw the linen wrappings lying there, but he did not go in. ⁶Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb. He saw the linen wrappings lying there, ⁷and the cloth that had been on Jesus' head, not lying with the linen wrappings but rolled up in a place by itself. ⁸Then the other disciple, who reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and believed; ⁹for as yet they did not understand the scripture, that he must rise from the dead. ¹⁰Then the disciples returned to their homes.

A TIME OF CONFESSION AND FORGIVENESS

Let's offer our honest confession ...

(Pause for a few moments)

Lord, you are risen, yet we doubt you. Lord have mercy. Christ, you appear to us, but we fail to notice. Christ, have mercy. Glorious Lord of life, have mercy on us. Have mercy on us.

(Take time now for your private confession)

This is the good news in Jesus Christ; God loves us more than we love ourselves. God forgives us, encourages us, and frees us to love others. Thanks be to God. Amen.

WE RETURN TO OUR HYMN OF PRAISE AS WE PREPARE TO THINK ABOUT OUR READING (STF 298 "Christ the Lord is risen today)

A REFLECTION ON THE READING

TODAY'S MESSAGE (CLICK TO WATCH/LISTEN)

The joke goes - What's the difference between an egg and a load of chocolate? Easy. You can beat an egg, but you just <u>can't</u> beat a load of chocolate. Today, I intend to have the best of both worlds - chocolate Easter eggs - loads of them ... I hope. We all know why we have eggs at Easter. A symbol of a tomb broken open and of new life. A symbol of something that isn't over and is about to start off again.

I may have shared this with a few of you before, but as 1999 was coming to an end and the year 2000 was about to begin, I happened to listen in on a good, simple, prize-free competition that was on the radio. It was on a programme called "Broadcasting House" on Radio 4. The task was very straightforward. All you had to do was come up with a single word that summed up the 20th century. That's all. But there was a twist, a catch. The one word you couldn't use was UNFINISHED.

Now I never did find out the result, but I wonder what the word was. I wonder what word you'd use? You might have a positive thought. Or maybe the latter years of the past millenium, the century so far, the past few years or maybe even this year haven't been so good for you. Perhaps the future is uncertain or dark. So what word would you use? The more I thought about it, the more I thought it would have to be the one word you weren't allowed to use - UNFINISHED.

Although it mightn't have been obvious to the disciples at the time, UNFINISHED is a word that could be used about the story of Good Friday that's just passed. Beginning with the conviction, and beating and mocking of Jesus, then Jesus is led away to be crucified. And when you and I and those we care about are struggling and suffering, we too ask "Is that all there is?"

UNFINISHED is definitely a word we could use about Peter's denial that he even knew Jesus, and the times when you and I keep our heads down when we know we should stand up and be counted. A sense of UNFINISHED business hangs over the very story of Jesus' crucifixion.

UNFINISHED is definitely a word that should be used about the Easter story in John. He offers another version of it. The details in the 4 gospels all differ. Each offers a slightly different view or memory, a different emphasis from each other, but they all agree on one thing - in the early morning of the 3rd day, a group of women make a risky journey to the grave of their leader. They come to clean and dress and embalm a cold, broken body. Instead, they find the tomb empty.

In John's story, they're shocked. Confused. Frightened. Disbelieving. Mary's taken aback, to say the least, when two strange figures speak to her and ask her why she's weeping. She's completely gobsmacked, astounded, when a figure she doesn't at first recognise as Jesus asks her the same question and then says — don't try to hold on to me, for this isn't over yet. Fear and

shock and astonishment give way to the beginning of faith in new life. What's important here is that it's UNFINISHED.

'Hang on' - says John and the other Gospel writers in their own way - hang on. Apart from the questions you might have — and there are plenty - and apart from what these witnesses say, it takes more than an empty tomb if we are to have a resurrection faith. This has to be the starting point. Not the end of an era. This has to be the continued unfolding of the story.

This isn't a story safely frozen and locked away in the Bible, or marked by a few chocolate eggs, or a bit of fun around an Easter Bunny. This has to make a difference to you and me and our world right here and right now – in the middle of a terrible war in the Ukraine. Iraq 20 years after its war and Afghanistan 2 years on. The Yemen, Syria. Massive tension and worrying sabrerattling between China, Russia and the West. Upheaval in the Middle East.

The twists, turns, toxicity and heartlessness that seems to permeate our politics and law-making and some law-keeping. Health and illness. Genuine and rising poverty – financial, child, energy, family, food. The mortgage trap. Fear of losing our homes. A poverty of hope and purpose. Death and life. Social care in a state of collapse and our NHS on its uppers with its wonderful staff just worn out.

For most of us, there's a general feeling of being overwhelmed and frightened. It's even worse for refugees with no safe route to asylum in the UK who are trapped and wither away in Calais and take life threatening risks to be free. What about the business of finding or keeping work, making the money stretch, loneliness, raising families, and what really goes on in our homes, heads, hearts and lives?

The 20th century - the whole millennium - human life and experience that spanned that millennium into this one, and into this century - it's unfinished. We don't just breath a sigh of relief and say it's dusted and done. There's more to it than a chance to mark the end of one batch of 100 or 1000 or 2000 years. What's next?

I guess that's a question we could also ask in the church in general. What's next? And a question we could ask as we try to journey forward together in our national Church, in our city, Circuit, and local Church. For us as people of

faith, as individuals, young, old, as neighbours, as citizens - as we don't give up on a confused, confusing, needy, frightening, exciting glorious world that's also full of possibilities - as we don't give up on each other, or our neighbourhood, or ourselves. What's next? Anything is possible — especially with God alongside us, right in the middle of things with us.

A fair few years ago we had a special Easter event for a Village school in the Methodist Church. In the previous weeks, nudged along by the Vicar and myself, we made things together in class to present and tell the Easter story.

We painted and drew. Sang, listened, told stories, decorated. One of the groups was asked to dramatise the Easter story. Written in their own words and acted in their own way. It was direct and simple, but what a punch line! I've never forgotten it.

Towards the end of their script, the risen Jesus says to the women "I have a job for you. Tell the rest of my friends that I'm alive. Tell them I will meet them on the sea shore in Galilee." Then the women all speak together. And you'll never guess what it is that they say in our children's play. They simply say: "That's where it all began." That's were it all began. Out of the mouths of babes and children comes wisdom and challenge indeed. AMEN.

WE SING OF THAT CHALLENGE & CONFIDENCE (STF 296 "Christ has risen while earth slumbers"

This is likely to be a new hymn to you in our hymn book from the Iona Community. The words are so apt. The set tune - 'Transformation' - is simple and beautiful, but it can also be easily sung to 'Scarlet Ribbons'. Try it and see what you think.

"Christ has risen" (CLICK FOR SET TUNE)

Sing/Read/Pray/Proclaim the words

 Christ has risen while earth slumbers, Christ has risen where hope died, as he said and as he promised, as we doubted and denied. Let the moon embrace the blessing; let the sun sustain the cheer; let the world confirm the rumour. Christ is risen, God is here!

- Christ has risen for the people whom he died to love and save; Christ has risen for the women bringing flowers to grace his grave Christ has risen for disciples huddled in an upstairs room. He whose word inspired creation can't be silenced by the tomb.
- 3. Christ has risen to companion former friends who fear the night, sensing loss and limitation where their faith had once burned bright. They bemoan what is no longer, they expect no hopeful sign till Christ ends their conversation, breaking bread and sharing wine.
- 4. Christ has risen and forever lives to challenge and to change all whose lives are messed or mangled, all who find religion strange. Christ is risen. Christ is present making us what he has been evidence of transformation in which God is known and seen.
