WELCOME TO THE 3rd SUNDAY IN ADVENT

As we worship on this 3rd Sunday in Advent, our fellow Christians in our various churches will be lighting the 3rd candle in their Advent ring. This candle can often have 2 meanings. It usually symbolises JOHN THE BAPTIST, a prophet and a voice in the desert crying out 'Prepare the way'. The candle can also be taken to symbolise JOY and today is often called 'Gaudete Sunday' or 'Rejoice Sunday', taken from the words of Philippians 4:4 "Rejoice in the Lord always."

LIGHTING THE ADVENT CANDLE

Ideally, you will need a candle that you can light, or you could look on the black and white picture of an Advent candle above. As you light your candle or focus on the picture, let's share in the words below that are being used today in the churches in our Nottingham North East Circuit:

Our Advent candles flicker, casting shadows spreading light, giving witness in the everyday, telling stories old and new. Advent God,

shine from us today.

When we've encountered God, we have a truth to tell. When we have seen God's light, we have a light to share. Advent God,

shine from us today.

When our lives seem ordinary and full of faltering steps, God's light still shines and bids us go and tell. Advent God,

shine from us today.

We share our very ordinary, our sorrows, joys and faith, and trust that those we share with will glimpse the light of God. Advent God,

shine from us today.

Advent God, we may feel we are not worthy to share your extraordinary message. We may feel we'll get it wrong; we don't know all the answers. We may feel we do not have the words; not erudite enough. As we light this third candle - shine upon us, light our path that it may speak, and show, and tell what you have done for us. **Amen.**

A TIME OF QUIET PREPARATION

Advent time. A voice cries out in the wilderness 'Make straight the way of the lord'. I too prepare for the coming of the Lord, the birth of Jesus, and make straight my life to meet my God.

(Let's be quiet for a while)

Sing/Read/Pray/Proclaim the words

O come, thou Rod of Jesse, free Thine own from Satan's tyranny; From depths of hell thy people save, And give them vict'ry o'er the grave: Rejoice! Rejoice! Immanuel shall come to you, O Israel.

OUR CALL TO WORSHIP

Besides this, you know what time it is, how it is now the moment for you to wake from sleep. For salvation is nearer to us now than when we became believers; the night is far gone, the day is near. Let us then lay aside the works of darkness and put on the armour of light; (Romans 13:11-12)

A GREAT ADVENT CAROL OF PRAISE AND HOPE (StF 228 "Hail to the Lord's anointed")

Sing/Read/Pray/Proclaim the words

INTRODUCING OUR OLD TESTAMENT READING

In Advent we prepare, not only for Christmas, but also for the second coming of Jesus. It is a time of hope and longing. In this reading from Isaiah, Jewish prisoners of war, returning from exile in Babylon, hear a promise from the Prophet. God will enable them to establish a just society and rebuild what has been ruined. You might recognise these words from Luke 4 where Jesus reads this scroll in the Synagogue, looking the coming kingdom of God.

OUR OLD TESTAMENT READING: ISAIAH 61:1-4, 8-11 The good news of deliverance

¹The spirit of the Lord God is upon me, because the Lord has anointed me; he has sent me to bring good news to the oppressed, to bind up the broken-hearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and release to the prisoners; ²to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour, and the day of vengeance of our God; to comfort all who mourn; 3to provide for those who mourn in Zion - to give them a garland instead of ashes, the oil of gladness instead of mourning, the mantle of praise instead of a faint spirit. They will be called oaks of righteousness, the planting of the Lord, to display his glory. ⁴They shall build up the ancient ruins, they shall raise up the former devastations; they shall repair the ruined cities, the devastations of many generations.

⁸For I the Lord love justice, I hate robbery and wrongdoing; I will faithfully give them their recompense, and I will make an everlasting covenant with them. ⁹Their descendants shall be known among the nations, and their offspring among the peoples; all who see them shall acknowledge that they are a people whom the Lord has blessed. ¹⁰I will greatly rejoice in the Lord, my whole being shall exult in my God; for he has clothed me with the garments of salvation, he has covered me with the robe of righteousness, as a bridegroom decks himself with a garland, and as a bride adorns herself with her jewels. ¹¹For as the earth brings forth its shoots, and as a garden causes what is sown in it to spring up, so the Lord God will cause righteousness and praise to spring up before all the nations.

AN ADVENT CAROL OF A PROPHECY FULFILLED (StF 171 "Hark the glad sound")

Sing/Read/Pray/Proclaim the words

- Hark the glad sound! The Saviour comes, the Saviour promised long; let every heart prepare a throne, and every voice a song.
- He comes the prisoners to release, in Satan's bondage held, the gates of brass before him burst, the iron fetters yield.
- He comes the broken heart to bind, the bleeding soul to cure, and with the treasures of his grace to enrich the humble poor.
- Our glad hosannas, Prince of Peace, your welcome shall proclaim; and heaven's eternal arches ring with your beloved name.

INTRODUCING OUR NEW TESTAMENT READING

John's gospel begins with the famous prologue; "In the beginning was the Word and the Word was with God, and the Word was God". This is more than the story of a carpenter from Nazareth. And the story goes on with another John - this time John the Baptist. He's portrayed more as a witness than a baptiser, a witness to the light. His gift is using his personal testimony to point people to Jesus and help them to recognise him. In his own way asks the Advent question - who or what are you waiting for?

OUR NEW TESTAMENT READING: JOHN 1:6-8, 19-28 The testimony of John the Baptist

⁶There was a man sent from God, whose name was John. ⁷He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. ⁸He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light. ¹⁹This is the testimony given by John when the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask him, 'Who are you?' ²⁰He confessed and did not deny it, but confessed, 'I am not the Messiah.' ²¹And they asked him, 'What then? Are you Elijah?' He said, 'I am not.' 'Are you the prophet?' He answered, 'No.'

²²Then they said to him, 'Who are you? Let us have an answer for those who sent us. What do you say about yourself?' ²³He said, 'I am the voice of one crying out in the wilderness, "Make straight the way of the Lord"', as the prophet Isaiah said. ²⁴Now they had been sent from the Pharisees. ²⁵They asked him, 'Why then are you baptising if you are neither the Messiah, nor Elijah, nor the prophet?' ²⁶John answered them, 'I baptise with water. Among you stands one whom you do not know, ²⁷the one who is coming after me; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandal.' ²⁸This took place in Bethany across the Jordan where John was baptising.

A SHORT THOUGHT FOR ADVENT

Matthew 11:10: Talking of the prophet John the Baptist, another prophet - Malachi - said: "See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way before you."

As you'll all know, if you walk up the street where you and I live, the flashing lights on the front of the houses tell you something's afoot! If you talk a dander - or a drive - around, you'll all have seen the same. It began weeks ago, but with 8 days to go to Christmas there are icicle lights on windows, snowflake lights in windows, flashing stars on gable ends, Santas flying up walls, reindeers between bedroom windows, inflatable lit-up snow men in gardens, twinkling lights on trees, flashing lights on everything. Praise the Lord for paracetamol and sunglasses! Maybe your house is one of them. It's great fun.

And if you haven't had enough already, I'm sure that you and I soon will have had enough of the razzmatazz of shopping's version and TV's version of Christmas already. What's going on?

In September a fair few years ago, even I stopped and stared in disbelief. There in someone's front window stood a fully decorated, flashing-lights-and-all Christmas tree. I shook my head, muttered, and walked on. Still 4 months to go. Then I began to think of the reasons for such an early start.

OK, we're used to it in the supermarkets - goodbye barbecues, hello Christmas, and let's have the Easter eggs on standby. But why this, why so early? Why so keen to bring Christmas so far forward (whatever version of Christmas it is that you have)?

When I chatted it over with a friend, he said something very deep - "It's because people are desperate for something to celebrate". Bull's eye, I thought. Many of us <u>are</u> desperate for something to celebrate. Let's face it, 2023 has been quite some year, with not much good news in it. Yep, many of us <u>are</u> desperate for something to celebrate. Now that could be something as limited as an excuse for few more choccies, a new gadget or two, and more bottles than usual of something nice. It could be as simple as a cheery time, the love of having the house decorated, having family and other folk around, and a fondness for the jolly chap with the white beard.

Or perhaps it could be genuine need - even a desperation - to celebrate, because sometimes there seems to be so little worth celebrating in the daily to-and-fro of and ups-and-downs of life. What sort of year have you had?

Or maybe it's because life is marked by a happiness that, when you look at it, rests on the trivial, celebrity, and a sort of happiness that you have to 'buy in'. What's your bank balance or credit card bill at the minute?

And there are plenty more reasons to want to (or need to) celebrate beyond these few. Some reasons are good, some not-so-good.

Matthew 11:10: "See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way before you."

Now don't get me wrong, you could put my name against most of the short list we've just worked through. But I am wondering - is there something more worthwhile, more substantial, something deeper-reaching, that we should be celebrating Christmas?

In the story set out in the Bible, and especially in Luke's gospel in the New Testament, we quickly reach the part where the Angel Gabriel (a messenger from God) comes to Mary to tell her that she will become pregnant with Jesus.

In Luke chapter 1 and verse 28 the angel says these words "Greetings favoured one, the Lord is with you." Mary, the Lord is with you in this moment as he is for us. In the world as it is today with all its needs and good and bad and goingson. Mary, the Lord is with you in the pregnancy and birth to come. As he is in life as it is for us, not as it ought to be.

Mary, the Lord is with you in the life to be led and the difference it'll make to all lives. The Lord is with you in all that you and future generations will face. The Lord is with you, and with us — as the people we are, not the people we should be.

Matthew 11:4 – and Jesus answered them: 'Go and tell John what you hear and see: the blind receive their sight, the lame walk, the lepers are cleansed, the deaf hear, the dead are raised, and the poor have good news brought to them.'

The Lord is with you. Whether it's a truth you've discovered in the year that is past, or a hope for the year to come, God really IS with us. Now that IS worth celebrating. So, God Bless you and yours this Christmas and always. AMEN.

A PERSONAL PRAYER

In silence, take some time to think about what this Advent thought sparks off in you. Is it a need of yours to be met? A burden to be lifted? Someone for you to reach out to? A hope? A cause to be part of? A meeting with God that you've experienced recently? Has it changed things? Is there something that you wish would change or that you need to change? Then pray:

I thank you for your unfailing love, In you I put my hope.
I thank you for your goodness, In you I put my hope.
Teach me your ways, In you I put my hope. Amen.

Sing/Read/Pray/Proclaim the words ...

The Lord is my light, my light and salvation; In him I trust, in him I trust.

Christ, hear our prayers for those known to us and for our own needs: (Pause to recall people and situations that are on your mind and to bring your own needs to God).

The Lord is my light, my light and salvation; In him I trust, in him I trust.

And we bring our prayers together saying: Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name ...

PARTING WORDS AS ADVENT-TIME CONTINUES

The journey continues; the third candle has been lit. Let light and hope go with you; be light and hope for a waiting world, for the Word of God became flesh and lived among us, and we have seen his glory, the glory as of a father's only son, full of grace and truth.

OUR FINAL CAROL - THE HOPE ADVENT GIVES (StF 207 "Jesus is the heart of Christmas")

The version below includes an extra verse that isn't in the version in 'Singing the Faith' and takes us beyond Advent and Christmas. The hymn can be sung to the tune "Christ is made the sure foundation".

Sing/Read/Pray/Proclaim the words ...

- 1 Jesus is the heart of Christmas, give the Lord his rightful place! Garlands, gleam with his charisma, tinsel, glisten with his grace! Jesus is the heart of Christmas welcome him with love and praise!
- 2 Jesus is the heart of Christmas, light your candles from his flame! Hang your holly in his honour, trim each fir tree in his name! Jesus is the heart of Christmas celebrate the day he came!
- 3 Jesus is the heart of Christmas, share him in each card you send. Give each gift in love and friendship, share his gifts which have no end. Jesus is the heart of Christmas, Lord and Saviour, Guide and Friend.
