Sermon

I AM NOT ASHAMED OF THE GOSPEL FOR IT IS THE POWER OF GOD FOR SALVATION TO THE JEWS FIRST AND ALSO TO THE GENTILES

Did you hear the interview that Amol Rajan had on the BBC with Gary Lineker? Amol asked Gary if he was bothered about what people thought of him. Gary said, "Why should I be bothered about what people who don't know me think of me. There are people who are close to me whose views I value but why should I bother with the views of those who don't know me?"

They said he wasn't much of a public speaker. They said he wasn't much to look at. That's what they said of Paul, not Gary Lineker, but it didn't bother him, either. He said, I AM NOT ASHAMED OF THE GOSPEL FOR IT IS THE POWER OF GOD FOR SALVATION TO THE JEWS FIRST AND ALSO TO THE GENTILES. Maybe, that sums up Romans for Paul saying in the verse in the letter, WE FAIL GOD, WE NEED GOD'S HELP, GOD'S HELP IS THERE

WE FAIL GOD

HOW CAN I FAIL GOD WHEN I DON'T KNOW WHAT HE WANTS?

Paul's answering that question. You know how he answers it. Of course you do. You've seen what He's done in nature. Talking about nature, you naturally have a sense of right and wrong, so you know what He wants.

You were made in the picture of God and by messing up your life, you've spoilt that picture. Maybe most of us do have a natural sense of right and wrong. We inherit it. There are some who, because of bad condition, may find it difficult to have that sense but I think most of us do.

In the days before Whats Aps, or even Emails, Arthur Conan Doyle, writer of Sherlock Holmes, hearing that everyone had a skeleton in his or her cupboard, was supposed to have once sent a telegram to a very Venerable Archdeacon, who nobody would criticize. It said, "All is discovered. Fly at once". The Archdeacon disappeared and was never seen again". So, the story goes.

Is one of the reasons why we want to conceal things because we realise we have done something that is wrong and feel others might think so, too?

Can we truly say that we are always true to God? Can we say that we have never let Him either by the things we have done or the things we have not done?

I don't like the examples Paul uses to make his point, it's his interpretation of the background of his time, but his point is still true even if his examples can be at best unhelpful.

Or, of course, we could say, I AM SATISFIED AS I AM

I know what God wants and I keep to it. I'm O.K.

I keep to God's rules, I make sure I behave right.

A preacher was berating the faults and failings of society. A lot of people like to hear that, especially if the preacher isn't talking about their own faults and failings. So, one lady was thoroughly agreeing with him as he went on. She cried out, "Amen, preacher". "Amen, preacher". Then he moved on to her own faults. She wasn't so pleased, "Ah, there, he's stopped preaching and started meddlin".

She hadn't actually got everything right.

If we assume we keep to the rules, and behave right, we only have to lapse from our standards once to break our own rules. This is why Paul said, "All have sinned and fallen short of the glory of God".

In other words we need the good news of Jesus, too.

"It's me, it's me, O Lord, standin in der need of prayer". This is what Romans 1 and 2 is about. It is saying, whoever we are,

WE FAIL GOD ... SO WE NEED GOD'S HELP.

You know how we sometimes say, "I've gone and said the same thing again".

"I thought I'd learnt" "Will I ever learn?" Paul puts it this way, "The good that I would do I don't do. The bad I don't want to do that's what I do".

There was once a Comedy called "BREAD". The Boswell family, who plan to milk the social welfare system to survive, meet for prayers at the meal. Billy says, "Mum, you taught us right from wrong, and I do both".

We do do both, but we can't seem to stop ourselves from saying or doing the wrong thing occasionally.

Paul says, "We're all a bit of a mess, really". Who is going to help us. Jesus, and his free gift of love, seen on the Cross. When we do things wrong, we've said it, almost, we spoil things with God, but when we say, "Yes", to Jesus to love seen on the Cross, God treats us as if we'd never spoilt things with Him at all. We can be satisfied with what we have achieved, with our career, with our education, with how we brought up our family, yet what's really important is that God chose to love us and Jesus went through what he went through on the Cross to show us that love. Then amazement takes over from pride.

But, for that to happen, we need to say to Jesus sometimes, "I'm in the wrong, and I need to put things right".

You know what it is said of the English, "The English are a race of self-made men – thereby relieving the Almighty of a terrible responsibility".

Not all, of course, but those who say they have no need of God or others tend to be most unattractive people. It seems that God is quite content to let them advertise themselves. Do we want to be that way ourselves or accept that we need God? That's my take on Romans 3.

GOD'S HELP IS THERE

Someone said, "God only tells us the bad news so he can give us the good news".

The concern with Romans is you hear so much of the bad news of how bad we all are, that you hardly notice the good news Paul talks about, which he does in spades.

He says Christ makes more than makes good all the damage that human failure has done. That's my angle on the first part of Romans 5. We might ask how that message might play in Ukraine or Gaza today, but it is Paul's belief.

"Oh happy fault that earned for us such a Saviour," was from an early Christian service.

Paul imagines some people saying, "Great, if Jesus is so gracious then I'll sin the more so he can be even more gracious". Can we say that?

There was a Methodist scholar, Donald English, who believed it would help if his class read Romans in the original Greek. They read Romans Greek. They read the passage in Greek, "Shall we sin the more that God's grace may abound" Paul's answer is to say, "Certainly not". In the Greek, "Mair Gevoito". There was a Geordie student who had a very strong Geordie accent. He was given the passage which included the words, 'mair genoito'. The Geordie student read the words, "Shall we sin the more that God's grace may abound?" He replied in the Greek, "Mair Genoiter". Donald English said, "He said it in exactly the tone that Paul meant. How could you? Christ has done so much or you. How can you think that way, and fail to live as He would want?

Instead, be transformed (Romans 12) by the renewing of your mind. You've got to be a new woman, a new man, now. You want to do what makes Jesus happy. God's Spirit will help you do just that. He rescues you. He goes on rescuing you. He restores you. Why would you want to do anything other? Could it not be that as we do this something beautiful, something healing happens inside us

Do we accept we fail God? Do we accept we need God's help? Do we accept that God helps us live his way? Will you and I go on making this life our own.

Can we say with Paul, I AM NOT ASHAMED OF THE GOSPEL. IT IS THE POWER OF GOD FOR SALVATION TO THE JEWS FIRST, AND ALSO FOR THE GENTILES", IN OTHER WORDS FOR EVERYONE. AMEN.
