Today's reading: 1 Corinthians 9:16-23

¹⁶ If I proclaim the gospel, this gives me no ground for boasting, for an obligation is laid on me, and woe betide me if I do not

proclaim the gospel! ¹⁷ For if I do this of my own will, I have a reward; but if not of my own will, I am entrusted with a commission. ¹⁸ What then is my reward? Just this: that in my proclamation I may make the gospel free of charge, so as not to make full use of my rights in the gospel.

¹⁹ For though I am free with respect to all, I have made myself a slave to all, so that I might win more of them. ²⁰ To the Jews I became as a Jew, in order to win Jews. Today's message

Paul is perhaps best known for three things. His encounter with Jesus on the Damascus Rd. His three or was it four missionary journeys around the Mediterranean. And his for letters that make up ¾ of the NT, all written before a single word of the gospels were written.

Letter that were written for a variety of reasons, to a variety or individuals, specific churches, or as a round robin to a group of churches. Written to answer questions. Written to explain. Written to encourage and extol. Written to condemn and criticize.

As so as we pick up those letters some 2,000 years after they were written, the challenge is rooting the content of the message we deliver in the contexts of these ancient correspondences and communities.

We need to ask was Paul writing about an issue specific to one church or generally to a universal situation the early church was encountering?

Paul wrote in order to respond to particular moments in the lives of these early churches, so let's start by thinking about Corinth itself. It was situated at a major crossroads of multiple trade routes. It was incredibly cosmopolitan city made up of a transient, very mixed population from all levels of society. It was also a place of great immorality; to 'corinthianise' was to live as someone with a very loose moral compass.

Is it any wonder that the church at Corinth was a mess. Scholars far cleverer than me have suggested there are 15 distinguishable problems that Paul addresses in 1 Corinthians. Problems that could be gathered into 4 main areas.

- Basic failure in relating to one another in love.
- Dramatic failure of the local church leaders to act considerately in the face of their competition for status and influence.
- Arrogant and differing theological reasoning.
- Tensions arising from the pressures that Paul's teaching about sex placed on his converts.

Each of these problems would have been bad enough, but when they were all present together, the combination was toxic. Can you just imagine the church councils in Corinth!!!

Now as a minister going around the circuit it is possible that I can encounter 15 different congregations and whilst I might deliver the same overall message to each one, the construction, the delivery, the tone of that message will be different.

In January for example I did five covenant services in five different churches, each one of them different in their approach and delivery, hopefully to suit each particular congregation.

For Paul, this devout Jew, this Pharisee of the Pharisees, this man who has been taught by some of the very best Jewish religious teachers, he had to find a way to deliver the good news to an enormous spectrum of people. People who in the main did not share his religious background.

Paul had to adapt his approach. He had to meet people where they were. He had to find common ground. He was to become different things to different people. He was in essence something that Boy George and Culture Club sang about 2000 years later. Paul was a.... let's sing together.

'Karma Karma Karma Karma Karma Chameleon'

To Jewish audience who had a grasp of the faith story, the rituals, the law, the promises of God, the long-awaited need of a Messiah...Paul is a Jew.

To a Gentile audience who know noting of those things... Paul is a Gentile. To people hung up with the law, Paul adapts and speaks to them accordingly.

To those who are new or indeed do not possess a faith, he changes his approach in order to connect with them and guide them to the fullness of life in Christ.

Whoever he is dealing with Paul seeks to know them, seeks to understand them, seeks to try to see the world through their eyes, attempt to see the ways they think and understand things and then adapts his customs, his approach and message accordingly just like a chameleon changes its colour to adapt to its surroundings / context

But that did not mean that Paul abandoned 'all that he held dear' (think back to our first hymn today) just so that he could win over a new audience.

No....Christ, Christ crucified and Christ risen again remained the steadfast rock on which his faith was based, one realised through that Damascus road experience and the decade or so of head scratching, thinking and reflecting on what that meant before Paul was ready to take his first ever steps to being an apostle to the Gentiles. A move and a mission that would cause him to go as far outside his comfort zone as its possible to get. And yet go he does.

John Wesley talked about his heat being strangely warmed during his Aldersgate experience...Paul isn't just strangely warmed... he is on fire about the Gospel. His love for Jesus animates everything he does. He simply cannot stop from telling others about the love of God. And he is willing to try to be all things to all people in order to do so.

The questions for us is do we have the same passion, the same desire, the same passion, the same fire to share the good news to others?

Can we adapt how approach so that that message is accessible, relevant and inviting to those who already know a lot, to those who know a little and to those who know next to nothing? That could be a church group, a gathering of families at a holiday event, a coffee morning or a care home.

Can we try to be all things to all people and yet still retain the core of the faith we share as we share it with others?

How can we like be like Paul and become a chameleon for Christ wherever we go and whoever we encounter. Amen
