Sermon

- 3 questions posed by our readings today that we are going to explore together.
- 1. What gifts has God given you?

One of the phrases that leaps off the page to me when I read this story is "to each according to his own ability." This leads me to ask the simple question: what has God given you to do? What is your role in building the kingdom?

Eagerness is something many of us grow out of in our teens. There is that sullen 'do I have to....' That plagues many parent/teenager relationships – 'Do I have to...clean my room', 'Do I have to...go to bed this early, none of my friends do!' and other such sayings! Fortunately, many young people grow out of that phase. I know my daughters did and by the time they were in their late teens and moving away from home they were actually really pleasant people, often willing to do those things that a few years before they had resisted doing!

As members of the family of God are we still keen, or are we like spiritual teenagers, only doing just enough to get away with it? What do we learn about eagerness form the example of three servants in Jesus' parable? And what about the trust placed in them by their master?

These 3 servants had been given enough. They had been given as much as the master thought they could handle. Remember, Jesus began the parable by saying the kingdom of heaven is like.... God has given us a responsibility, according to our ability too. Two of these servants thought about what they might do, and probably with some eagerness, went about doing it. So, they grew what they had been given. The third one, was not so eager! Maybe they were more like that sullen teenager, lacking enthusiasm. He decided to bury it, just leave it. He knew it would still be there when he came back to it, but he never bothered anymore and got on with his life.

They were given talents, the money of the day. They were given them to do something with. I wonder what gifts God has given us. Sometimes we think that gifts are only given to certain people – those who stand up and preach for example or play the organ or sing. But that most definitely is not the case. God has called us all for a purpose, and he has gifted us all for a purpose. Sometimes the seemingly most insignificant gifts turn out to be the most significant. Never underestimate your gift. The Abbess Hild – sometimes knows as Hilda – lived in the Abbey in Whitby. She is remembered on November 17th each year. She was a great supporter of people's gifts – she didn't make a lot of noise about it, but she was. The most famous person to have benefitted from her support was Caedmon. Without her support and her gift of encouragement he might never have become England's first poet. Never underestimate the gifts you have been given, and the power they have to change people's lives.

2. What are you doing with the gifts?

Remember in the parable that one had 5 talents, one had 2 talents, and one had 1 talent. So not all are given the same. Wouldn't it be boring in the church if we had all been given the same talents? How incomplete the Body of Christ would be if we were all preachers! There would be no one to listen to the preaching would there. God, in his wisdom, has wonderfully balanced out the distribution of talents because He knows and loves each one of us and knows the kind of person we are.

When we look at Paul's writings he of course writes about the distribution of gifts within the church – In Romans 12 he lists prophesying, serving, teaching, encouraging, caring for the needs of others, leadership. There are other places in the New Testament where he lists other gifts. It's interesting that he puts leadership at the end of his list here – leadership is not the most important, none of them are more important than another. Each one is a gift, given by the Master.

So, what are you doing with your gift? Are you burying it away like the slave with 1 talent? Or are you using it? Are you letting others use their gifts because you think their gift is more important than yours? That is certainly not how God sees it or wants it to be. Everyone has been given a gift to use for the benefit of others – what are you doing with yours?

3. Are you ready for the Master's return?

One of the top takeaways from this parable of the talents is the suddenness of the master's return. There is no warning that he is coming back. He just arrives and imagine the panic that may well have set in as the servants realise this is it! The time has come to show what they have been doing. This prepares us, as Christians today, for the beginning of Advent in a few weeks' time, when we will be focussing on the Second Coming of Jesus and our readiness for that. So here, Matthew is urging the followers of Jesus to be ready for the Lord's return.

How do you react when you have an unexpected visitor? Are you the sort of person who welcomes them, tells them it's good to see them and makes them a cup of tea? Or are you the sort of person who doesn't like unexpected callers? You are thinking that the sitting room isn't very tidy, you haven't got any milk in the fridge and all sorts of other possible things that might make you dread someone just calling by unannounced! It can be difficult sometimes when we have unexpected callers! I wonder what the 3 servants were thinking when news reached them of the master's return – 'where did I put that money? If only he hadn't come back today, just when I'm so busy...' but he had returned, and the servants needed to account for all they had done with his money.

Zephaniah tells the people of his time that they must be ready, for the Day of the Lord is coming! He warns the people of his time that their money and all the things they might have will not do them any good, because those things don't really count with God. Zephaniah is very much a prophet of doom, like Amos and Micah who could see that the people had got it all wrong, their priorities were all wrong, and that one day, God would deal with them. Zephaniah is full of doom and wastes no time telling people exactly how it is. I wonder, what are the things we do today that might get a modern Zephaniah cross? Maybe it is gathering money and possessions for ourselves, maybe it is not using the gifts God has given us to benefit others?

I wonder, what are the things we might do for others that Jesus would like to see? What would please God's heart as we and He look upon the world and its people at this time? Where we see conflict, greed, despair, war, famine, loneliness....we could go on.

For us, as Christians, it is clear that one day Jesus will return. He talked about it so much when he spoke to his disciples. We read it time and again when we look at the gospels and especially in so many of the parables. We have only to look at this parable to see what Jesus thought about those who kept what they had been given purely for themselves – when the third servant gives his excuses for not doing anything with the talent the master says 'You wicked and lazy servant' – that is what he thought about it and I think Jesus is making the point that is probably what God says about it too. And there is no way back for that servant – the punishment is very clear right at the end of the parable. Zephaniah makes it really clear in his time that God is not pleased with those who have misused what they have been given, they too will be punished.

When we read the whole parable, there are two different responses given to the servants. Two of them heard "well done" and one heard "you wicked, lazy servant." We need to focus on what we do with the gifts God has given us. The number of gifts or what the gifts are doesn't matter – it is what we have done or are doing with them that matters.

How does this challenge you and me today? We might think we have done our bit, that we have nothing else to give or do in the service of God. I think that makes us like the servant who made his excuses – 'I'm too old, I've done my bit' 'There isn't anything I can do now', 'why would God

want me to do this or that in the church or for my neighbour?'. If we can't do anything else we can pray, we can perhaps pick up the phone and call people, we can write letters to people, we can call on a neighbour to make sure they are ok. These, alongside the gifts that others might exercise within the church, are equally important.

The Bible reminds us that 'there are many gifts, but the same Lord, there are different ways of working, but the same God works all of them in all people'.

Creator God who has given us all that we have
We give you praise and thanks.
Remind us of our gifts when we lose sight of them.
Show us where and how to share them.
Give us the courage to offer them freely, as you give to us.
What others may seek to destroy, help us to protect and care.
