Second Sunday in Advent

Theme: John the Baptist – Be Prepared I suggest that you have four candles – one for each week of Advent. Light one for each week of Advent. This is week two – so light two candles.

Call to Worship:

A day is coming when people will sing; "I praise you Lord! You were angry with me, But now you comfort me and are angry with me no longer. God is my saviour; I will trust Him and not be afraid."

Prayer of adoration and Praise:

Prayers of Confession:

Lord, we heard that you were hungry: But we did not give you food: Forgive us Lord, forgive.

Lord, we heard that you were thirsty: And we kept our drink for ourselves: Forgive us Lord, forgive.

Lord, we saw you as a stranger: And we closed the doors of our hearts: Forgive us Lord, forgive. Lord, we saw you go naked: And we fussed about our own clothes: Forgive us Lord, forgive.

Lord, we discovered that you were sick: and we avoided contact with you: **Forgive us Lord, forgive.**

Lord, we heard that you were in prison: And we pretended that we did not know you: **Forgive us Lord, forgive.**

Lord, you came to us again and again: But we ignored you:

Reading: Isaiah 40: 1-5 and 9-11

"Comfort my people" says our God. "Comfort them!

Encourage the people of Jerusalem.

Tell them they have suffered long enough and their sins are now forgiven.

I have punished in full for all their sins."

A voice cries out, "Prepare in the wilderness a road for the Lord!

Clear the way in the desert for our God!

Fill every valley; level every mountain.

The hills will become a plain,

And the rough country will be made smooth.

Then the glory of the Lord will be revealed,

And the whole human race will see it.

The Lord Himself has promised this."

Jerusalem, go up on a high mountain and proclaim the good news!

Call out with a loud voice, Zion; announce the good news!

Speak out and do not be afraid.

Tell the towns of Judah that their God is coming!

The Sovereign Lord is coming to rule in power,

And bringing with Him the people that He has rescued.

He will take care of His flock like a shepherd;

He will gather the lambs together and carry them in His arms;

He will gently lead their mothers.

Reading: Mark 1:1-8

This is the Good News about Jesus Christ the Son of God. It began as the prophet Isaiah had written: "God said, 'I will send my messenger ahead of you

To clear a way for you.'

Someone is shouting in the desert,

'Get the road ready for the Lord;

Make a straight path for Him to travel!"

So, John appeared in the desert, baptising and preaching. "Turn away from your sins and be baptised," he told them, "and God will forgive your sins." Many people from the province of Judea and the city of Jerusalem went out to hear John. They confessed their sins and he baptised them in the River Jordan.

John wore clothes made of camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist and his food was locusts and wild honey. He announced to the people, "The man who will come after me is much greater than I am. I am not good enough even to bend down and untie his sandals. I will baptise you with water, but he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit."

Sermon:

I wonder what preparations you are making for Christmas. If you are anything like me then, part of the preparation is writing cards and, very importantly, is the letters that I write to go in them. And the older I get, the more letters I need to send!

God made **His** preparations for Christmas. Part of His preparation for the coming of Jesus was the work and message of John the Baptist. Now John was a bit of a wild man – not the kind of man we would expect God to use – but his preaching prepared the way for the coming of Jesus. Again I ask, what preparations are you making for the coming of Jesus into the world? And what exactly are you preparing for?

In the shops, preparations began in September! Just after the "Back to School" notices come down – or even in the January sales. Last year, in the sales I found a notice which said, 'shop early for Christmas – buy now and save a packet!'

At this time of year we definitely know that we are part of a consumer society. Consumerism and greed have taken over from faith and religion. The television adverts tempt us with messages like 'what do you really want?' You should have it; you deserve it!

Some time ago I happened to record a late night programme. When I watched it, I was staggered to learn that it's no holds barred for adverts late at night. According to one advert, the best way to prepare for Christmas is by buying a sex toy for you partner "for the best Christmas ever!" And, did you know that all the bingo and poker computer sites are open for 24 hours on Christmas Day? You have probably seen the adverts for 'Park Catalogues' telling us to save up now for the best ever Christmas **next** year! Shopping Malls and computer or television have become the churches and cathedrals for our culture and society.

Please don't misunderstand me; I am not a killjoy; having a party, giving gifts to those we love, having fun and celebrating with a feast – absolutely! But, the way we celebrate depends on what we are preparing for. Is it simply a family get together? Is it so that the children can have a good time? After all "Christmas is for the children" – is it really?

Or, are we getting ready to celebrate the coming of the Son of God into the world? If it is, then there are other things to be done as well as the writing of the cards and the endless buying of presents and food.

God's preparation for the ministry of Jesus was summed up in the preaching of John the Baptist. So, what did he say? 'Repent – turn away from selfishness and greed of this generation.' This is an uncomfortable message at this time of year but we can't get away from the fact that this is the preparation we are expected to make. John says in Matthew's Gospel, that we should prove our repentance by the fruit we bear – show it by the life we lead. Look around at those in our society who have no way of celebrating – the homeless, the hungry, the refugee, the poor – if we want to be prepared for His coming we need to do something for them.

And, how do we prepare ourselves? Having fun can be exhausting! I suggest that we take a little extra time to pray or read something to help us to develop spiritually like an Advent book, or is Jesus being squeezed out by Father Christmas?

We are told in John's Gospel that John the Baptist was 'The voice of one, crying in the wilderness, "Prepare the way of the Lord. Clear a straight path for Him."

For centuries, God has been preparing the way for the coming into the world of Emmanuel – God with us. Read again Isaiah 40 also Isaiah chapter 11. In the preaching of the prophets, particularly Isaiah we have hints of the coming of God's Son, coming into a dark and wicked world. In chapter 11 of Isaiah we hear just the kind of Saviour He would be – ruling the whole world with Justice and Peace, feeding the poor and hungry, wiping away all tears and pain. There would be no more violence and war.

In the whole of the Roman world there was a sense of expectation, not just among the Jews but all over the known world people were expecting God to act. Into this world came the preaching of John the Baptist, who seemed to speak into people's deepest needs.

Do we still need the Son of God in these days?

This is a most frightening world. There is more fear now that at any time since the 1930s. There is a rise of right wing extremist and belligerent nationalists in America and Europe where anyone who is different is treated without compassion. On the other hand we have tension between Palestinian's and Israeli's and a rise of Islamist extremists. We have thousands of refugees on our roads and seas, desperate to escape the violence they have experienced. Everywhere there is a surge of violence and war – Sudan, Ukraine, China and Afghanistan – and so the list grows. The world has become a frightening and unstable place.

But we have a message of love, peace, compassion and justice coming into a dark and violent world: as followers of Jesus, let us be sure that this Christmas we make that message known; a message of love and hope; not only in words but with peace and joy in our hearts, in actions as well as words.

Come, Lord Jesus, come!
