Reading: John 4: 7-15

A Samaritan woman came to draw water and Jesus said to her, "Give me a drink of water."......

The woman answered, "You are a Jew and I am a Samaritan - so how can you ask me for a drink?" Jews will have nothing to do with Samaritans.

Jesus answered, "If only you knew what God gives and who it is asking you for a drink, you would ask Him and He would give you life-giving water."

"Sir" the woman said, "you haven't got a bucket, and the well is deep. Where would you get that life-giving water? It was our ancestor Jacob who gave us this well; he and his sons and his flocks all drank from it. You don't claim to be greater than Jacob do you?" Jesus answered, "All those who drink this water will be thirsty again. But, whoever drinks the water that I will give him will never be thirsty again. The water that I give him will become in him a spring which will provide him with life-giving water and give him eternal life."

Reading: Jeremiah 2:9-13 "And so I, the LORD, will state my case against my people again. I will bring charges against their descendents. Go west to the Island of Cyprus, and send someone eastward to the land of Kedar. You will see that nothing like this has ever happened before. No other nation has ever changed its gods, even though they were not real. But my people have exchanged me, the God who brought them honour, for gods who can do nothing for them. So, I command the sky to shake with horror, to be amazed and astonished, for my people have committed two sins: They have turned away from me, the spring of fresh water, and have dug out cisterns, cracked cisterns that can hold no water."

Sermon Pt 1: The Fountain

Introduction: Text: Jeremiah 2: 13 "My people have committed two sins. They have rejected me, the fountain of living water and have hewn out cisterns for themselves, broken cisterns that can hold no water." Speaking through Jeremiah, God refers to Himself as 'the fountain of living water'. This picture of living water is used about God and His Spirit on a number of occasions in the OT – In our NT reading, Jesus is speaking to the Samaritan woman and He refers to the living water He is able to supply – Later in John's Gospel Jesus refers to Himself as the Living water.

Water is one of the four things we need for nourishment and life – air, water, food and light. In a country like ours, where we often see more water than we can deal with, perhaps we don't quite appreciate how important it is:

It is when we don't have water that we learn to appreciate it – some years ago during a particularly cold winter, the pipes in Sutton in Ashfield burst and a friend of mine was without water for nearly two weeks: She had to collect water from a collection point every day - even the simplest things like flushing the loo or making a cup of tea was a major task and took so much time.

When the Bible spoke about water, we have to remember that the people in Israel had an appreciation of the life giving properties of water. They got water from two different sources. There was natural, clean, running water either from a spring or well or there was standing, often polluted water from a stone cistern. Israel only has rain from November to April and the people caught as much of it as they could in cisterns to use during the dry times. Some cisterns were huge, built by the town or village authorities and some were hewed out of stone by householders.

But this was static water, suitable for washing or irrigation and often mud and silt built up in the bottom of the cistern. In this passage God speaks about these two sources of water

God always referred to Himself as the source or the fountain of living water - of the clean, cool, running water – spoken to people Palestine in the heat of summer, they would have longed for a drenching in that cool clear, running stream.

God expects His people to long for Him in that way. Do you long to be drenched in the presence of God? God is saying - and Jesus means the same thing - that we can find refreshment if we turn to Him – we can be soaked in God. So often our lives are full and busy – sometimes with church duties, sometimes with family duties, sometimes with other work. But God longs to refresh us with His Spirit. But we need to take time out to be with Him, talk to Him about our lives, let Him help us to balance them and then refresh us. We don't want to wait until some illness or infirmity makes us stop - we need to take time out to walk in the countryside, or in a garden to admire the beauty all round us. Stand still, take it all in and allow the Spirit to wash over us.

This fountain of living water is also life giving:

In Cyprus, where I lived for six years - from April to November everything dries and is parched - the ground is white and lifeless - then the rains come. There is a startling transformation - Within days the fields are carpeted with wild flowers, first the delicate wild cyclamen then the bright yellow crown daisies. They grow in huge and beautiful abundance.

Do you feel sometimes that your spiritual life is dry, dull and lifeless? Do you need it to grow and develop? It is so easy to just get into a routine - forgetting to pray until there is a crisis - never bothering to read a Bible - not really moved by worship. It takes commitment - putting aside time to just be with God - to read the scriptures there are so many daily Bible reading notes to help. But be warned! If you ask God to refresh you and help you to grow, be prepared to change. That's what growing means - change and development. But, if you are ready - come to the fountain of living water and see what happens. Or will we be like the people of Israel and reject the fountain of living water?

Sermon Pt 2: The broken cistern So, let's look at the other part of God's condemnation of His people.

He says that they have rejected Him, the fountain of living water and have hewn out cisterns for themselves, broken cisterns that can hold no water.

The water from the cistern is very different, polluted, muddy and often diseased. God likens His people to these cracked and broken cisterns so that even the water they have is draining away. What did He mean? Ever since the Israelites came to the Promised Land they had polluted their beliefs and worship with foreign gods. Yes, they worshipped Yahweh in the Jerusalem Temple but they hedged their bets and at the same time, they worshipped at shrines of the local Canaanite gods, taking part in the rituals that go with them. First Isaiah, Hosea and Amos, and later Jeremiah warned them of

the consequences of going this way. Already the ten tribes of the northern kingdom of Israel had been swept away by Assyria, Jeremiah warns that the same thing will happen in the southern kingdom of Judah and Jerusalem - but they don't want to hear. The army of Babylon are at the very gates of Jerusalem but still they won't listen. Poor Jeremiah was so badly treated and he wants to stop preaching about destruction - but he can't keep it in. Strangely enough, they threw him into a huge cistern and left him to die in the mud - until he was rescued by his faithful scribe Baruch.

With Hindsight we can have 20/20 vision. We can see of course that the Israelites were heading for destruction and that they deserved it. But have we got anything to learn from this? We, like them are faithful in our worship - we take part in all that our church has to offer - but do we, like the Israelites, worship false gods as well? Do we rely on broken cisterns that can hold no water?

Certainly the society in which we live are doing this all the time - call themselves Christian, use the church for weddings, baptisms and funerals but as far as belief is concerned, they cherry pick what they like from Christianity and then add in folk and pagan beliefs - very like the Israelites. They have also made false gods of wealth, possessions, celebrity and status. But we are not like that are we? Do we worship false gods? Have we been polluted by the society we live in? Do we long for more money, possessions, status? Does God get pushed into second place. Interests and hobbies can of course be wonderful and help us as busy people to relax – but when they become an obsession and they take over our lives then they become our false gods.

How can we dare do this to the creator God of time and space? Have we tamed Him so that He is a nice comfortable god? This false view of God is making Him into a false god.

If the answer to any of these questions is 'yes' then this passage is for us. **We** have rejected the fountain of living water: **We** have hewed out cisterns for ourselves, broken cisterns that can hold no water.

The consequence for the Israelites was that they were carried away into captivity – Jerusalem was destroyed and the Temple stood in ruins. I don't think that we are likely to be carried away into captivity! But many churches, once vibrant and full, now stand empty. Do we want to reverse the decay? It is up to us, His people to turn back to the fountain of living water and give up the false gods of money, possessions etc.

So, the message is simple. Our God is waiting to bless us with a great outpouring of refreshment and life – if we will turn away from our false gods and come to Him and for His refreshment. Story and meditation – Lazy geese I read recently about a farm in the north of Norway which was on the flight path of the Canada Geese who in the spring time,

fly thousands of miles north to their summer feeding grounds where, for the short summer months, the vegetation is rich and nourishing. There they mate and raise their young before making the long flight back south before the harsh northern winter sets in.

Every spring when the birds were flying over, some would land on the farm for a rest and peck at the corn lying around the farmyard before taking off again to join their kin on the journey north. Then, some years ago, a group of geese landed to feed and when the rest of the flock flew over, they started making honking noises and took off. They flew around for a few minutes and then came back to the farm yard. They did this every time more flew over but always they came back. They obviously thought that the living was easier in the farm yard! Eventually all the geese flying north disappeared into the distance but his visitors stayed put. They raised a few chicks and stayed for the summer. The farmer wasn't worried. He thought that when the autumn came they would rejoin their brothers and sisters flying south. However, when the geese flew over head they made a terrific racket and flew around for a while but soon returned to the farm. The farmer was sad. The geese seemed to have given up the idea of flying anywhere. They gave up their freedom and sense of adventure for the easy living of the farm yard. During the harsh northern winter, the farmer made sure

the geese had food and shelter so they were really very comfortable. Over the next few years they even stopped making an effort to take off. At first they made their honking noises but eventually even that stopped. Each year a few chicks were born, but they took no notice of their wild and free cousins as

they flew first north then south. Just occasionally, when the geese flew over, one or two would look wistfully up to the sky but nothing would persuade them to take off and fly with the others.

The farmer realised that, with no new blood and only a few new chicks being born each year, they would eventually die out. Over the years the older geese grew fat and slow and then died. At last, just a few of the younger ones were left. The farmer tried to encourage some of the youngsters to take off and join their cousins on their flight south. But no, they really weren't interested. In the end, they too will die and it made the farmer sad.

Meditation:

Is that what we've become Lord? Have we gone for the easy option? You said we could rise up as on eagles wings; Take flight; Live the adventure with you. And what have we chosen? The comfortable life of the farmyard: Eating the corn and making do with second best. Sometimes we look wistfully at what could have been. As you provided nourishment for the geese in the northern feeding grounds, So you provide nourishment for us your children.

You promised to pour your spirit into our lives, A living fountain But again we may choose to ignore what you provide for us to grow. It just takes too much energy We're tired and we just can't find the time.

Father God, what will become of your church if we don't change and grow? If we don't learn again to fly with you? Perhaps there is a lesson to be learned from the geese Lord.

Prayers of Confession:

Lord, Holy Spirit of God, Drench your children with your Spirit, So often your Spirit in us is dimmed by our selfishness and greed.

There are times when we ignore those in need.

We sometimes look at other people and feel we are better than them so we turn away.

We criticise other people who are doing the best they can.

We can make others feel inferior.

We are unprepared to speak out against injustice.

We are unprepared to stand up for Christ or witness to His love.

And so, the Spirit is dimmed. Forgive us Lord and enable your Spirit to shine through us so that others will see you in us and turn to you and find the answer to all their deepest needs.

We thank you Father that you have promised that when we come to you in repentance you are always prepared to forgive – so forgive us Lord and help us to change. Amen

Prayers: Intercessions

Lord of peace; bring peace where there is violence. We bring to you Lord, the people of Yemen, of Afghanistan and we continue to pray for the people of Ukraine. We also pray for the people of Russia who are unaware of what is going on in Ukraine. In the Darkness Let your light shine

Lord of creation; forgive us for misusing your created world and making deserts where there had been abundance, for polluting clean air and water. We pray for the governments of the world who promised to limit climate change. Give courage to those who work to save the environment. We pray for those who are suffering because of climate change – the peoples of Sub Saharan Africa who are suffering the worst drought in living memory, those suffering because of violent floods or wild fires. In the Darkness Let your light shine

Lord of healing and wholeness; we bring to you those who are known to us personally who need your healing

power..... In the Darkness Let your light shine

Lord of the Kingdom of God, who came into this world, not to condemn it but to save, work with your people, give us courage, wisdom and power as we bring the message of your love and forgiveness to a needy world. Send your Holy Spirit and may your Kingdom Come. In the Darkness Let your light shine. Amen
