⁵ At Gibeon the LORD appeared to Solomon in a dream by night; and God said, 'Ask what I should give you.' ⁶ And Solomon said, 'You have shown great and steadfast love to your servant my father David, because he walked before you in faithfulness, in righteousness, and in uprightness of heart towards you; and you have kept for him this great and steadfast love, and have given him a son to sit on his throne today. ⁷ And now, O LORD my God, you have made your servant king in place of my father David, although I am only a little child; I do not know how to go out or come in. ⁸ And your servant is in the midst of the people whom you have chosen, a great people, so numerous they cannot be numbered or counted. ⁹ Give your servant therefore an understanding mind to govern your people, able to discern between good and evil; for who can govern this your great people?'

¹⁰ It pleased the Lord that Solomon had asked this. ¹¹ God said to him, 'Because you have asked this, and have not asked for yourself long life or riches, or for the life of your enemies, but have asked for yourself understanding to discern what is right, ¹² I now do according to your word. - ³¹ He put before them another parable: 'The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed that someone took and sowed in his field; ³² it is the smallest of all the seeds, but when it has grown it is the greatest of shrubs and becomes a tree, so that the birds of the air come and make nests in its branches.'
- ³³ He told them another parable: 'The kingdom of heaven is like yeast that a woman took and mixed in with three measures of flour until all of it was leavened.'
- ⁴⁴ 'The kingdom of heaven is like treasure hidden in a field, which someone found and hid; then in his joy he goes and sells all that he has and buys that field.

Relection Pt 1: Solomon's wisdom

There are lots of legends and folk stories where someone is granted a number of wishes, (often 3) and the sad results of them not thinking through the consequences of what they ask for.

- 1. A 90 year old man married a 20 year old woman, and a genie granted him one wish. He said "I wish I was the same age as my wife" ...and there was a puff of smoke... and in a flash the genie changed his wife into a 90 year old woman. Not what he expected at all!
- 2. A married couple was granted 3 wishes, and the man, being hungry, immediately asked for a large pork sausage. It appeared. His wife annoyed at his foolishness exclaimed "I wish that sausage was on the end of your nose" and it was. The man said "How stupid... I wish the sausage was gone". It disappeared. Their 3 wishes had been wasted.

You may think their choices were foolish, but in their situation, would you have been any wiser?

Lesson from Kings is an old story, recounting how when Solomon was asked what he wanted from God, he chose wisdom.

He sought an understanding mind to govern and care for God's people. He wanted the ability to discern between good and evil.

He could have asked selfish things for himself. But realised that that would not help build his kingdom. He recognized that a selfish "me me me" attitude could not sustain the kingdom. He describes himself as "a little child," one who does "not know how to go out or come in." His concern was for the kingdom not himself.

Solomon asked for wisdom: a listening heart, a heart with ears, a heart that would hear the pain of the world, the needs of the people, and the voice of God. He did not ask for himself long life, riches, or even the defeat of his enemy.

And it pleased the Lord.

And that's not where the story ends. If you read a couple of verses past today's text you will read, "Then Solomon awoke; it had been a dream" (1 Kings 3:15).

It was a dream but not just a dream.

That it was a dream doesn't mean it wasn't real and it doesn't mean that when Solomon woke up it was the end of the dream. To the contrary, his awaking was the beginning of a new reality. He awoke to a new possibility, for himself and for the people. That reality and possibility would be realized every time Solomon had a choice to make about how he would govern his kingdom.

God was pleased with Solomon because he had put the welfare of his people first. Solomon wanted their good and prosperity before any material benefit for himself, before any personal pursuit for power, before any desire for popularity.

And the choice Solomon had to make is one we all face.

Many of the situations of conflict in our world, our communities exist because of selfish motives, choosing a self-centered attitude over one that is more costly but for the common good.

Whether you consider the recent economical collapses, or the harsh treatment of migrants and asylum seekers by this present Government and those who press to keep our borders closed... in fact in many decisions the government makes, one must question whether selfishness is at the heart of it. It seems to me that often decisions are not made for the good of all the people but for the vested interests of the rich and powerful.

Oh that the wisdom that Solomon was granted would have extended further...to this time and place.

For Solomon, Wisdom was about putting **others** first (vv10-14)

And of course this was a key message in the gospels about what God requires of us. When Jesus was asked which was the greatest commandment He answered, "Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the first and greatest commandment. And the second is like it, love your neighbour as yourself." (Mt.22:37-39)

And to love our neighbour we need those gifts that Solomon was given, a heart to listen to God, a listening ear to the cries of those in need, so that we can find ways to respond.

So how can we listen to God, how can we respond to the needs of the world and our community?

Reflection Pt 2: The mustard seed

I want to move on now to the gospel lesson. I am especially interested in the two parables at the start of this passage.

It is important to note that Jesus does not say the Kingdom of God is like a mustard seed.

Instead, He goes on to say that "The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed *that someone took and sowed.*"

It is the seed when it is sown that illustrates how the Kingdom, which began small and in secret will one day bloom.

Equally in 13:33 the parallel is not simply that the Kingdom is like yeast (or leaven) instead it is yeast that "is taken and mixed with the flour" which forms an illustration of this new community which, when mixed through, leavens the whole.

It is the taking and the planting that allows the tiny seed to germinate and the mixing together that enables the pinch of yeast to do it's work.

What does planting and mixing mean for the situations we face in our lives, our community and our church?

It's about doing something. It is our actions which make the difference, turning potential into results.

Around the time of Jesus, A Roman author and philosopher, Pliny the Elder, wrote that mustard seeds, with their pungent, fiery taste, were valued for being good for the health – and that they spread like a weed. Once sown, it was difficult to stop them, because the seeds germinated almost at once.

Isn't it a powerful image Jesus uses of planting the tiny mustard seeds of the reign of God, tipping them into the world like a contagious weed.

My garden is full of weeds and I always seem to be fighting a losing battle to keep them under control. Not helped by the fact that dandelion heads are so much fun for children to play with.

We might ponder what sort of contagious seeds Jesus was planting with his message and his ministry of healing and teaching. Each story Jesus told, and each story told about Jesus, gives us an image of one of these seeds germinating in the soil and spreading God's reign.

And those seeds planted all those years ago have flourished and spread, just as the kingdom has flourished and spread and continues to.

What do we need to do? What decisions do we need to make? How can we with our limited abilities and meagre resources help the Kingdom to grow?

Two of the other parables about the field full of treasure and the pearl of great price, perhaps give a hint, because they speak of giving up everything we have in order to gain the treasure and the pearl.

And giving up everything is hard.

Perhaps we have given all we are able to, and our energies are spent. Maybe we face difficult choices and maybe we do not know the answers. Sometimes we need to just trust in God to guide us.

Two key points from today's lessons:

- 1. The Kingdom will continue to flourish regardless of what we do. Like a contagious weed is cannot be stopped.
- 2. Solomon asked for wisdom, a heart to listen to God, and listen to the needs of others. We should ask for the same.

Afraid of the future and of those around us

we sometimes keep the seed of the Kingdom rather than planting it,

sometimes we store the rising yeast instead of stirring it through.

Help us to be the sowers of the word and the sharers of blessing

that in our place and our time all whom we meet

might encounter the living God.

We pray for our nation in all its diversity.

We ask for those who must make decisions on our behalf,

wise and discerning minds

that the right paths may be chosen

and the whole people may be served.

We pray for those we know the best and love the most.

For some of them these are days of fretfulness or fearfulness,

confusion or despondency, emptiness or addiction.

Help us, where we can, to ease their burden and share their load.

Even when it seems there is nothing we can do

we still hold them before You in the silence of our hearts.

Eternal God, throughout the centuries

You have called people into service

and have equipped them with gifts

for using and sharing in the Kingdom's cause.

We give thanks for their faithful service

and we remember in particular

those who sowed the seeds of faith in us.

Keep strong our faith and enliven our witness

that the Church of Jesus Christ may prosper

and that many come to find for themselves the love of God

from which nothing can separate us. We ask things through Jesus Christ our Lord **Amen**
