This week, we're going to think a little bit about the All We Can Harvest 2022 partnership and look at the work there are doing in the Binga region of Zimbabwe. Let's being with some words from scripture.

Opening Psalm 139:1-15

- 1 You have searched me, Lord, and you know me.

that anyone on whom I lay my hands may receive the Holy Spirit.' 20 But Peter said to him, 'May your silver perish with you, because you thought you could obtain God's gift with money! 21 You have no part or share in this, for your heart is not right before God. 22 Repent therefore of this wickedness of yours, and pray to the Lord that, if possible, the intent of your heart may be forgiven you. 23 For I see that you are in the gall of bitterness and the chains of wickedness.' 24 Simon answered, 'Pray for me to the Lord, that nothing of what you have said may happen to me.'

Luke 13:10-17

10 Now he was teaching in one of the synagogues on the sabbath. 11 And just then there appeared a woman with a spirit that had crippled her for eighteen years. She was bent over and was quite unable to stand up straight. 12 When Jesus saw her, he called her over and said, 'Woman, you are set free from your ailment.' 13 When he laid his hands on her, immediately she stood up straight and began praising God. 14 But the leader of the synagogue, indignant because Jesus had cured on the sabbath, kept saying to the crowd, 'There are six days on which work ought to be done; come on those days and be cured, and not on the sabbath day.' 15 But the Lord answered him and said, 'You hypocrites! Reflection

Throughout the New Testament, we see hands are often the instrument used to convey God's will. Hands are used by Jesus to heal people, Peter and John lay hands on people to help them receive the Holy Spirit.

Jesus uses his hands as he humbles himself when he washes the disciples' feet, and later to show Thomas his wounds to prove he's alive. Hands can also be used for ill, Pilate washes his hands in a symbolic act of distancing himself from Jesus' death, and the guards grab Jesus with rough hands as they arrest him.

It's easy to look at our hands and assume we don't have much to work with, but often if we operate from an assumption of abundance rather than scarcity, we can do much more than we imagine. Our hands may be things we take for granted, but think how much work they do. They clean and tidy, they pack and unpack, lift and place, they write and turn pages as we read, the

comfort and show empathy with touch, they type and cook, sew and play musical instruments. The list is endless.

It's not just our hands that are important it's also the resources we use. The Zubo Trust in Zimbabwe (partners with All We Can in the Binga region) started by asking "what resources do we have in our community, how can we use them to help people?" They recognised that the ilala palm trees were a resource they had in abundance, and they used their hands to turn that resource into something that empowered women in the area. The women of the area began to weave baskets, which they could sell on and use, thereby making them their own heroes, making them the people with the power over their own destinies. All We Can partnered with The Zubo Trust in order to work with the people of Binga region, to empower them, and give them agency over their own lives. They pride themselves on using the resources they have available to them and using their hands to transform that into something as beautiful as the baskets.

As well as talking about what we do with our hands, these Bible passages also have something to say about power – how we use it, and how we perceive it. When Simon the magician sees the Apostles enabling people to receive the Holy Spirit he says "give me this power" Simon hasn't understood the need he feels for the power, he thinks it's a simple gift that Peter can bestow on him, but he hasn't considered where the power comes from, what it means to have it, or what he'll do with it if he gets it. What would you do with such power as this? The power to give people the Holy Spirit, the power to heal, but also the power to make a name for yourself, to get fame and glory.

All We Can tries to heed this in its approach to international development. It would be so easy to go to a struggling community in a low-income country, and impose an initiative or some equipment on that community which helps with their material situation in some way. But that does nothing to empower that community, and it does everything to reiterate their dependence on Western help.

In the Luke passage, we hear of the synagogue leader using the situation as an excuse to

reassert his own power, rather than to celebrate the woman regaining her autonomy and freedom. Instead of glorifying in the fact the woman is healed, he sees an opportunity to condemn Jesus, and exert his own power, by showing the people Jesus has done the wrong thing, and he himself knows scripture and the law better. He has no concern for the woman or the fact she has been healed from all her suffering.

The purpose of international development, and indeed the church's work with all marginalised people, needs to be to reduce power imbalances between countries and communities, not uphold them. The way All We Can tries to do this is to be totally led by the local partners they work with. All We Can did not tell Zubo to make baskets, it supported them in their vision of tackling poverty. Coming alongside them, not standing over them. Helping communities use the power and autonomy they already have.

This is not just about organisations, it is also about us. Simon wanted to be the hero in other people's stories – he wanted to be the one who was bestowing the Spirit on people, he wanted credit for the transformation of others. This can be a temptation in our charitable giving – to think that we are the heroes in other people's stories. When we give, whether its monetary gifts, time or the gifts we have from God such as musical gifts, singing, or cooking or making banners or helping others – whatever we give we can't do it in order to gain praise, or to be noticed, or to get power. It should only be done for the glory of God and to help, not for self-promotion.

If we were to archetype the synagogue leader perhaps he would be like the person who insists he knows best about what people in poverty need, or worse dismisses the problem entirely. Simon would be like the person who is smug about their giving and thinks they are the hero in the story.

When it comes to global poverty, and how we tackle injustice in our communities, these stories invite us to find a middle ground – neither indifference nor overbearance, neither insisting something should be done our way nor that it should not be done at all, neither reluctance nor arrogance. The middle ground is partnership –

taking the next steps hand in hand alongside a community.

This is a journey All We Can has been on with the women of Binga, and it's one we are invited to join in with.
